## Description of review process:

The program in Leisure Studies at Oklahoma State University is accredited by the National Recreation and Park Association (NRPA) and the American Association for Leisure and Recreation (AALR) as a professional program. Further NRPA/AALR has also accredited two options — Leisure Service Management and Therapeutic Recreation - in the Leisure Studies program at Oklahoma State University. Leisure Studies is the only accredited program in this discipline in Oklahoma and is one of approximately 100 such programs nationwide. The program in Leisure Studies is hosting its 20-year continuing accreditation visit during spring 2005. Thus, this program review coincides with the self-study for continuing accreditation. Since 1990, that self-study completed every five years has been accepted as the appropriate documentation for the OSRHE program review.

That self-study process, extended to this program review, was coordinated by a faculty member in Leisure Studies. However, the process included on-going assessment efforts, input from all faculty in the program, input from students in the program, input from professionals in the discipline, and review by appropriate administrators at Oklahoma State University.

## Program objectives:

The program serves two options within the degree program, Leisure Service Management and Therapeutic Recreation. The primary goals for the Leisure Service Management option are:

- 1. To prepare individuals for professional roles in the variety of agencies within the leisure service delivery systems.
- 2. To provide an opportunity for the acquisition of skills necessary to perform in planning, leadership, programming, management and other roles pertinent to the delivery of leisure services.
- 3. To develop the ability to apply principles and techniques of problem-solving and decision-making as related to the administration and management of programs in leisure services.
- 4. To provide an opportunity to apply didactic knowledge through planned sequential experiential learning

The primary purposes or goals of the option in Therapeutic Recreation are:

- 1. To develop skills and competencies of current and future professionals in Therapeutic Recreation.
- 2. To increase the provision of and access to therapeutic and regular recreation services by residents of Oklahoma with disabilities.
- 3. To improve the quality of therapeutic and regular recreation services provided for persons with disabilities in the state of Oklahoma.

#### Student outcomes assessment:

As an NRPA/AALR accredited program, Leisure Studies has established and maintained an active assessment process for more than twenty years. Outcomes included in that assessment are:

- Graduates who desire employment in their respective fields can find a position within a reasonable time.
  - O Seventy five percent of all students completing a Leisure Studies degree will find employment appropriate to their degree within the State of Oklahoma.
- External review of preparation provided by the program through the Internship experience.

- Ninety percent of all students completing a Leisure Studies degree will be rated excellent or above average by their respective internship supervisors.
- Five-year accreditation review by the National Recreation and Park Association and the American Association for Leisure and Recreation.
  - o Oklahoma State University will maintain accreditation under NRPA/AALR.
- Seventy five percent of all students declaring a Leisure Studies major will complete the degree.
- Professional certification examinations.
  - All graduates completing degrees in Leisure Studies will meet sitting requirements for the appropriate certification examinations.
  - o Further, ninety percent of all students completing a Leisure Studies degree will successfully complete (pass) their national certification examination on the first attempt.

### Program recommendations:

Curricular changes were made during 2001 - 2002 and monitored during the past year. An "outdoor certificate" program was developed in conjunction with the COE Extension Office and Outdoor Adventure. Procedural changes in approval of internship sites have been implemented. All faculty meet weekly to discuss issues related to the program and assessment of the program. Information is shared among the faculty at those meetings.

Recommendations from the faculty in Leisure Studies are reflected in the five-year plan presented by the unit. Following are the major recommendations in that strategic plan.

- 1. Receive approval for two tenure line Assistant Professors one during the 2004-2005 academic year, the other for 2005-2006, both of which are replacements for faculty who departed in summer 2004. Seek approval for one new tenure track Assistant Professor in 2006-2007. These faculty lines are crucial to continue compliance with NRPA/AALR accreditation standards and to sustain productivity and quality in the program.
- 2. Maintain seven to nine half-time assistantships for graduate students majoring in recreation and leisure.
- 3. Attract, retain and develop ethnically and culturally diverse students within the requirements established by Oklahoma State University and the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education.
- 4. Attract, retain and support the development of ethnically and culturally diverse faculty members when the opportunity for recruitment is available.
- 5. Sustain institutional support for the Leisure activity courses including adequate and properly equipped space for course delivery and institutional respect for the credit, knowledge, learning, and life competency generated through these courses
- 6. Maintain accreditation from the NRPA/AALR Council on Accreditation through continued "Self-Study" to assure compliance with standards.
- 7. Gain approval for and recruit a Research Professor under the newly implemented OSU policy with the intent of enhancing scholarship, productivity, external funding, and extension/outreach activity.
- 8. In compliance with recommendations from external review, programs within Schools in the College of Education should have greater voice in budgetary planning.

## **OVERVIEW**

A. Description of the Departmental/Program Review Process (Briefly describe how the review was conducted and who was involved)

The program review was coordinated by Dr. Erik Rabinowitz for the School of Applied Health and Educational Psychology. At the program level, Dr. Lowell Caneday prepared the review documents, manages the annual assessment process, and prepared the 20-year self-study for continuing accreditation through the National Recreation and Park Association/American Association for Leisure and Recreation (NRPA/AALR). This self-study process served as a primary source for information to be included in this program review – as has been the case since 1985. All faculty in Leisure Studies, doctoral students in the program, masters students in the program, undergraduate students, and numerous professionals in the discipline participated in preparation of the self-study and the resulting program review.

B. Recommendations from Previous Program Reviews. (Discuss actions taken to address the recommendations of program faculty from the last program review.)

NRPA/AALR accreditation reviewers have commended the faculty, the program, its students and Oklahoma State University during each of the accreditation reviews – 1985, 1990, 1995, and 2000. The only recommendation during the 2000 review was to permit greater input from the coordinator of Leisure Studies in the budget process. That recommendation was ignored by leadership in the College of Education and input has regressed further during the past five years.

Assessment of the program conducted by the faculty resulted in curricular change in 2000. The program has remained stable since that time. The only programmatic change since that time has been in personnel and in change of one course (LEIS 2443 Diversity in Leisure Services) to a general education course (now EDUC 2443 Contemporary Issues in Diversity).

Program faculty have recommended (1) a change in policy by the OSRHE and Oklahoma State University to recognize credit earned for Leisure activity courses toward graduation, and (2) a consistent practice of funding seven graduate teaching assistants in Leisure Studies, combined with consistent funding of seven graduate teaching assistants in Health and Human Performance, to assure best quality instruction in Leisure activity courses. Those recommendations have not resulted in support at the School, College, or University levels.

- External review of preparation provided by the program through the Internship experience.
  - Ninety percent of all students completing a Leisure Studies degree will be rated excellent or above average by their respective internship supervisors.
- Seventy five percent of all students declaring a Leisure Studies major will complete the degree.
- Professional certification examinations.

The productivity and record presented by Leisure Studies documents its linkage to the mission of Oklahoma State University. Leisure Studies faculty members are active in research, discovery and dissemination of knowledge. Their research enriches lives, enhances economic development and environmental management, and improves the quality of lives for numerous clients. The faculty members are active in outreach through professional service statewide, nationally and internationally, and through extension activities aiding individuals and communities.

The faculty members in Leisure Studies have deliberately chosen to not offer courses solely by electronic or other distance delivery methods. Electronic media are utilized to enhance a number of courses offered through more traditional means.

C. Articulation Agreement (Identify the articulation (2+2) agreements the program has with community colleges)

No community colleges in Oklahoma offer discipline specific courses that lead to the baccalaureate degree in Leisure Studies. As a result, the general articulation agreements for the College of Education and Oklahoma State University serve students well in transfer to Leisure Studies.

Oklahoma City Community College has been active during the past year in planning a curriculum that will articulate well with Leisure Studies at Oklahoma State University. That planning has included several discussions between OSU and OKCCC.

**D.** Multidisciplinary programs (Briefly describe how program faculty participate in multidisciplinary programs with other OSU departments or other institutions)

The faculty members in Leisure Studies participate actively in two multidisciplinary programs at the Graduate level – Gerontology and Environmental Science. Leisure Studies faculty members serve on the respective advisory boards and teach within the programs.

In addition, faculty members in Leisure Studies at Oklahoma State University serve as co-investigators on research with faculty from other OSU departments and other Oklahoma colleges or universities.

# CRITERION III Program Resources

A. New facilities and major equipment (Describe major changes in facilities and major equipment added in the past 5 years)

The major change in facilities and equipment for the program in Leisure Studies has been the modification and renovation of the Colvin Recreation Center. However, that renovation yielded only minimal change (painting, carpeting, and new windows) for the academic programs housed in the Colvin Center.

Leisure Studies also utilizes computers and other electronic equipment to a greater extent in 2005 than was true in 2000. For example, classrooms now have supporting technology that enhances the instruction to a much greater extent than was true in 2000.

**B.** Academic and administrative efficiencies (In the past 5 years, what strategies has the program used to achieve greater academic and administrative efficiencies?)

Efficiencies have been achieved through increased effectiveness in teaching, achieved largely through utilization of electronic support for course delivery.

Faculty members in Leisure Studies teach courses in Environmental Science (ENVR) and in Health and Human Performance (HHP).

Leisure Studies is a 'discovery' major. As a result, most students enrolled in the baccalaureate program in Leisure Studies have transferred into the program after having had other majors at OSU or after having attended another college or university. Upon entering Leisure Studies, more than 75% of declared majors matriculate to graduation within three years.

## 2002 -

- Leisure Studies is doing an excellent job of graduating, placing and preparing students for appropriate
  certification exams. The report from the accreditation visitor's review in 2000 was positive with no major
  concerns and secondary concerns related to various support services. The action by the NRPA/AALR
  National Council on Accreditation was finalized in October 2000. On going unit review occurs and is
  reflected in a dedication to excellence. This occurs through specific objectives in teaching, research,
  service, people and place.
- Strong positive comments have been received from employers and internship supervisors regarding the
  quality of preparation given to OSU students in Leisure Studies. These comments have been voluntary in
  nature and have included both instate and out-of-state professional agencies.

#### 2003 -

- All graduates are employed. Two graduates are in "related fields." One graduate is pursuing a graduate degree.
- 15 of 19 graduates (80%) responding to the assessment found employment in Oklahoma.
- All graduates were rated above average or excellent on the overall evaluation by their respective internship supervisors.
- Current retention of declared majors to graduation is 93%.

#### 2004 -

- All respondents are employed. Four respondents indicated employment in "related fields." Three respondents are pursuing graduate degrees.
- 31 of the 44 respondents (70.4%) are presently employed in Oklahoma. Employment opportunities for Leisure Services Management students have declined in Oklahoma, while OSU graduates are successful in finding employment regionally and nationally.
- All graduates were rated above average or excellent on the overall evaluation by their respective internship supervisors.
- Current retention of declared majors to graduation is 94%.
- Reports from NCTRC and NRPA indicate that all graduates who attempted the certification examinations
  passed on their first attempt.

E. Graduates from the past five years were surveyed in 2004. Among the 64 graduates who responded to the survey, 84% were employed in the field of 'recreation, parks and leisure.' Among these respondents, 70.4% are employed in Oklahoma. Among the respondents from the past five years, 12% of the graduates have pursued graduate degrees. Three graduates indicated they were not employed in a 'recreation, park and leisure' position. Reported salaries for these graduates ranged up to \$35,000. Of those who responded to the survey, 80% indicated they were 'adequately' or 'very well' prepared for their current position. When those graduates who are working outside the field or pursuing graduate studies are removed from the response to this question, all graduates indicated they were 'adequately' or 'very well' prepared. Those who are pursuing graduate degrees indicated they were 'adequately' or better prepared for their respective graduate or professional degree program. All respondents were 'satisfied' or 'very satisfied' with their overall educational experience at OSU.

In October 2000, the program in Leisure Studies was granted continuing accreditation through 2005 by NRPA/AALR. The National Council on Accreditation commended the program for the productivity of the faculty, the professional involvement and activity of the students and the faculty.

## B. Societal Needs for the Program

Recreation and leisure are crucial to quality of life, to economic development, to health and well being for individuals and for society. In Oklahoma, recreation and tourism rank as one of the top three business and employment sectors annually (with agriculture and energy). Unfortunately Oklahoma leads the nation in a number of adverse health statistics: percentage of obese youth, number of youth beginning use of tobacco, percentage of youth who use tobacco, percentage of the population with type-2 diabetes, and number of teenage pregnancies. Leisure Studies offers programs and solutions related to many of these concerns.

Further, in an aging population, the knowledge and behaviors provided through Leisure Studies offer modification of lifestyles to improve quality and quantity of life. As 'Baby Boomers' reach retirement, their expectations of quality of life, length of life, opportunity for leisure experiences, and available funds exceed those of previous generations. The demand for programs and services over the next decade will increase dramatically.

In addition, the condition and use of the environment for recreation and tourism relies on knowledge, research, and professional intervention provided through Leisure Studies. This extends to societal changes in ethnicity, demographics, and other measures demanding higher quality services and more thoroughly prepared professionals.

This program review is of the Bachelor of Science program in Leisure Studies. Although both Master of Science and Doctor of Philosophy degrees are also included in this program, they are not a part of this program review.

Leisure Studies is unique at Oklahoma State University and in Oklahoma. This is the only NRPA/AALR accredited program in Oklahoma. The only similar program in the state is the park management program at Southwestern Oklahoma State University, a program that is not accredited by NRPA/AALR. All other programs in Oklahoma using titles or course content that address recreation, parks and leisure studies are allied with traditional and archaic 'health, physical education, and recreation' programs.

- Receive approval for two tenure line Assistant Professors one during the 2004-2005 academic
  year, the other for 2005-2006, both of which are replacements for faculty who departed in
  summer 2004. Seek approval for one new tenure track Assistant Professor in 2006-2007. These
  faculty lines are crucial to continue compliance with NRPA/AALR accreditation standards and to
  sustain productivity and quality in the program.
- Maintain seven to nine half-time assistantships for graduate students majoring in recreation and leisure.
- Attract, retain and develop ethnically and culturally diverse students within the requirements established by Oklahoma State University and the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education.
- Attract, retain and support the development of ethnically and culturally diverse faculty members when the opportunity for recruitment is available.
- Sustain institutional support for the Leisure activity courses including adequate and properly
  equipped space for course delivery and institutional respect for the credit, knowledge, learning,
  and life competency generated through these courses
- Maintain accreditation from the NRPA/AALR Council on Accreditation through continued "Self-Study" to assure compliance with standards.
- Gain approval for and recruit a Research Professor under the newly implemented OSU policy
  with the intent of enhancing scholarship, productivity, external funding, and extension/outreach
  activity.

## **D.** Five-Year Goals for the Program


## **MISSION**

The Leisure Studies program facilitates the preparation of professionals in Leisure Services, research and scholarly inquiry, and the provision of services for discovery, learning and participation that contribute to the health, economy and quality of life.

## **VISION**

The Leisure Studies program seeks to facilitate learners' personal and professional development through educational experiences guided by values, knowledge, and skills necessary for excellence in the leisure services profession. We envision a world and its citizens made better through understanding and enjoyment of healthy leisure lifestyles.

## **GOALS & OBJECTIVES**



GOAL 1.00 – TEACHING AND LEARNING: To educate students in the undergraduate and graduate programs in Leisure Studies and professionals to meet changing social and professional needs through learning experiences and degree programs of the highest quality.

- 1. Sustain seven to nine 0.50 FTE (full-time-equivalent) graduate teaching assistantships per year.
- 2. Sustain institutional support for the Leisure activity courses including adequate and properly equipped space for course delivery and institutional respect for the credit, knowledge, learning, and life competency generated through these courses.
- 3. Sustain six faculty tenure lines recruit and hire well-qualified faculty members.
- 4. Add one new tenure track Assistant Professor line in 2006-2007.
- **Objective 1.01**: Identify areas of excellence and potential growth in an effort to focus and optimize resources.
- Objective 1.02: Review and update course content related to changing professional and social needs.
- **Objective 1.03**: Review course offerings in Leisure Studies throughout the calendar year to provide continuity of program.
- **Objective 1.04**: Evaluate and develop fieldwork opportunities and review all policies related to fieldwork, including review and revision of the fieldwork manual.

#### Critical Success Factors

- 4. Average four proposals for external funding for Leisure Studies per year.
- 5. Achieve and sustain two graduate research assistants at 0.50 FTE per year through University and College funding.
- 6. Sustain one sabbatical leave proposal from the faculty each year.






